WILL OF CASPER KULP

In the name of God, Amen, I Casper Kulp, Being weak of body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God therefore, calling into mind the Mortality of my Body, knowing that it is appointed for all Men once for to die do make and ordain this my last will and testament principally and first of all I give and recommend my Soul unto the Hands of god who gave it and my Body for to be Buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executor and such worldly Goods as it hath pleased God to Bless me with in this Life I give and bequeath of in the following Manner Viz:

First my Will is that all my lawful debts be paid.

Imprimis I give To my four daughters, Mary Taylor, Barbara McKeney, Margaret Brown and Cathren Lance to each one I Give and bequeath one shilling stirling Money of Great Britan and no more.

Imprimis I give and bequeath to my son Peter Kulp my large Bible.

Imprimis I give and bequeath to my son Benjamin Kulp one negro boy named Tom**

Imprimis I give and bequeath to my son John Kulp my plantation on which I now live with all the improvements thereunto belonging likewise all my Plantiation tools and one Negroe Wench named Cate.

Imprimis my will is that all my Household furniture with my Stock of Horses, Cows, Sheep and Hogs be sold and equally divided amongst my five sons Peter, Henry, Benjamin, Augustian and John.

I likewise constitute and appoint Capt. Robert Patton Executor of this my last Will and Testament and do revoke and disanul all former Wills and testament by me made or Given, In Witness whereof I have hereunto Set my Hand and Seal this Thirtieth day of September 1769.

2. BARBARA⁴ CULP (*HANS CASPER³ KULP, PETER² KOLB, DIELMAN¹*) was born 1733 in Bucks Co., Pennsylvania, and died 1782 in Chester, Camden District, South Carolina. She married WILLIAM MCKINNEY, son of PATRICK MCKINNEY and MARY UNKNOWN. He was born 1729 in Virginia, and died April 27, 1785 in Chester, Craven District, South Carolina.

Notes for BARBARA CULP:

In an Indian attack in August 1761, Barbara Culp was scalped by Cherokee Indians, but she survived to raise her family. There's a historical account written by her grandson documenting this attack and her survival. After the scalping, Barbara wore black silken caps to hide the wounds. The caps were passed down and some of her descendents are said to still have them.

Barbara Culp McKinney is recognized in "Women of the Revolution."

She was pregnant with her daughter Hannah at the time she was scalped.

In 1790 Camden Dist., Chester Co. S.C. census, Barbara is listed with one male child over 16, one male child under 16 and 5 slaves.

Barbara Culp is the daughter of Hans Casper Kulp, b. July 13, 1692, Swartznau, Palatinate, Germany; d. April 30, 1770, Camden District, Craven Co., Charleston, S.C. and Alcordas Phillis, b. Germany; and died before 1764. On Sept. 15, 1729, Hans Casper Kulp arrived in Philadelphia, PA, from Rotterdam, Holland, on the ship "Allen."

Benjamin Culp, Sr., Barbara's brother, b. 1741, Chester Co., S.C. d. Oct. 29, 1819, Chester Co., S.C. (burial Burnt Mtg. House Cemetery, Chester Co., S.C.) fought in the Battle of Fishing Creek, S.C. as a pvt. under General Sumner in the Revolutionary War on April 28, 1781. He became a doctor, orator and gentleman farmer on a plantation he owned on Tinker Creek Section of eastern Chester Co., S.C.

Joan Stewart and Jackie McAbee visited the graves at the Burnt Meeting House Cemetery. The DAR has erected her a new monument with the inscription of her being scalped by the Indians.

Barbara Culp McKinney is the ancestor of Joan Stewart.

The Daughters of the American Revolution placed the tombstone on grave with the information describing why she was named a "Woman of the Revolution." I'll expand on the information a bit since she is my direct ancestor.

While her husband William McKinney was away fighting the Indians who the British enlisted to help in their cause in the Revolutionary War, Barbara had neighbors who were related to stay with her. Barbara had called for their assistance when some of the older females had kept a raiding party of Cherokees from attacking the McKinney homestead.

Despite this near attack, Barbara had to milk her cow for her small children. She was pregnant when she was attacked, raped, scalped and left spread nude upon a large rock. When she regained consciousness, Barbara could see the Indians pulling corn from her brother John Culp's field. She lay very still until she was sure the Indians were gone. She crawled back to her cabin.

Her husband William McKinney, who had a terrible dream that his family was in danger, had headed home with all the speed his horse could give him. When William arrived, Barbara was on the bed and her wounds were still bleeding--which they did a bit until she died--but she was alive and recognized his arrival with tears of relief.

In the meantime, the Indians had killed a husband and wife and taken their five children hostage on a neighboring farm. The neighborhood men banded together in pursuit of the Indians to rescue the children. The men managed to kill a number of the raiding Indians when they surprised them where they'd camped. One of the dead Indians had Barbara's scalp in his leather pack. The men brought back the children, as well as Barbara's scalp.

Barbara wore a black, silk scull cap for the rest of her life. [Bob Stevens' relative had one of these scull caps around the turn of last century.] Barbara gave birth to Hannah, the child she had carried in pregnancy during the brutal attack. Hannah was healthy but had a birthmark that looked like a tomahawk dripping blood. Barbara had other children and did not die until 1782--twenty-one years after she lost her scalp.

Barbara had brothers John, Peter, Benjamin and Augustine Culp/Kolb who fought in the Revolutionary War, as did her husband William McKinney. She died in Chester County, South Carolina and was buried in the Burnt Meeting House Cemetery near Richburg, Chester County, South Carolina; as is her husband and her brother Benjamin and her daughter Mary McKinney McFadden and husband Ralph. Barbara's miraculous recovery became the talk of the Revolutionary and post Revolutionary settlers of the District of South Carolina.

Notes for WILLIAM MCKINNEY:

In 1739, William was a horse drover from Virginia to South Carolina. On Aug. 11, 1774, he bought 100 acres of land adjacent to the former land of Hans Casper Culp, his father-in-law, where there is a famous landmark today in Chester Co.

William McKinney was an American Patriot during the Revolutionary War.

Will of William McKinney

In the name of God Amen. Twentieth Day November One thousand Seven hundred and eighty two. I William McKinney, being through the mercy of God calling the mind the uncertainty of this life do make, constitute and ordain this my last will and testament and desire that it may be received by all as such I have my body to the earth from whence it was taken to be buried in a Christian decent manner at the discretion of my Executors herein after named.

I leave my soul to Almighty God my Creator and to Jesus Christ my Redeemer and to the Holy Ghost my satisfier, begging their most glorious acceptance of me, a returning penitent sinner. As concerning my worldly estate which it hat pleased God to bestow upon me I leave a bequest in the following manner. Viz. I leave and to my sons John and William, the house and plantation I now live on containing three hundred and fifty acres be is less or more I leave to my sons James and Henry three hundred and fifty acres, being parts of three tracts to be equally divided between them. Likewise, I leave by daughter Hanna one hundred and fifty acres of land likewise forth acres be it less or more of the lower end of the place bought of Edw. White the line is to begin at the creek at the mouth of the Spring Branch. Likewise I will that my wife

may have the benefit of the lower plantation left to Ja. And Henry during her life and the use benefit and command of the Negroes during her life and after her decease the three oldest Negroes is to be given to John, Wm., and Hannah I leave to my daughter Mary a Negro wench called Min to be given her at the age of twenty one my sons Henry is to have the increase of the Negro wench till Mary is of age. I leave to my sons Jas. A Negro boy to be given at the age, Likewise I leave to sons Henry, a young Negro child, Fawn, Likewise I will and desire that at the decease of my wife the one half of my cattle and moveable effects to be given to my two youngest children and the other half is to be given to or equally divided between John, Wm. Hannah, and Mary Likewise I constitute appoint my wife and my sons John, my lawful Ex'rs of this my last will and testament in witness my hand and seal the day and year above first written. Wm. McKinney, his mark.

John Steadman was a cousin to Capt. Robert Steadman who was killed at Walnut Grove Plantation by the Tories, and was the first person buried in the cemetery at the WG Plantation

Excerpt from Colonial and Revolutionary History, by J.B.O. Landrum:

"In Draper's "King's Mountain." the following story is related:

Sam Brown, known as plundering Sam, and another whose name was Butler, went to the house of Josiah Culbertson, son-in-law of Col. John Thomas, in the Fair Forest region, where he mistreated Mrs. Culbertson. Her husband coming home at night, was informed of Brown's insolence and unbecoming conduct. His temper was so aroused that he determined to capture or kill him and thus rid the country of a bad man. Selecting a man by the name of Charles Holloway, he started at once in pursuit. Early the next morning they were joined by William Neal, William McIlhaney and one, Steadman (this is Capt. Robert Steadman).

It is stated that these determined men pursued Brown some ten miles, and as they were passing the house of Dr. Andrew Thomson on Tyger River, they discovered in the stables the horses of Brown and Butler. Retracing their steps they concealed themselves near the stables. Very soon Brown and Butler appeared at the door, when Culbertson leveled his rifle on him and sent a ball into his body which killed him. Holloway, who was near him, fired at Butler but missed him and Butler made good his escape.

"Col. T.J. Moore, of Moore, S.C., in a communication to the Carolina Spartan, April 7th, 1894, stated that he had investigated and found the scene of murder of Sam Brown. Colonel Moore states that the house where Dr. Thomson lived is the present Pinson or "tin roofed" house, now occupied by Mr. Newton Bearden, a mile or two from Otts Shoal going east, and on the road from Walnut Grove to Marches' Shoal bridge, in the direction of Woodruff.

This old historic house is built of hewn logs, had two large rooms below, flight of stairs and two rooms above. Long years ago it was weatherboarded which preserved the logs. The same floor is in it now as was then. The planks are wide and notched down at every sleeper to make it level and true. There is a cellar in the middle of one room. The nails used were wrought ones. The hewn logs for the most part are in a good state of preservation. The old fire place is ten feet wide and ten feet thick between the rooms. It is further stated in Colonel Moore's article, that the blood of Brown is still on the door and floor near it, and that for a long time the hole of the bullet that was shot at Butler and which struck the house was seen, and that until the past few years the tree under which Culbertson and his friends were concealed was standing.

Sam Brown's grave is about a mile from the place where he was killed, across a branch and near a shoal on the branch, and directly between the houses of Mrs. Trail and Belton Steadman. Colonel Moore visited the grave, which was pointed out to him by Mr. George P. Moore and Mr. Steadman, both of whom were familiar with the tradition of the killing of Sam Brown".

From Tom Ashworth:

The Steedman family is particularly interesting. They come from an impressive Scottish family which can be traced back to the 1100's in both the Steedman, Stedman, now called Steadman.

Stedman/Steadman/Steelman Families of the New World

At about 1784, John Steelman married Hannah McKinney, daughter of William and Barbara Culp McKinney of Fishing Creek in the present Chester County, SC. In the summer of 1761, Barbara was scalped by some Cherokee Indians. Hannah was born three months after her mother was scalped.

On October 6, 1795 a tract of 24 1/2 acres of land situated in Camden District (Chester County) was surveyed for John Stedman. This land lay on waters of Rocky Creek, and was bounded S.E. by John Dick's land, N. E. by John Glaze's land. On 2 November 1795 a grant for the tract was issued to him, as shown by records in the State Archives at Columbia, SC (State Grants, Vol. 41, p. 465; and Plat No. 16-Bundle 173).

At the time of the 1790 census for Chester County, John's family consisted of himself, his wife, and two young daughters. Also living with him were three children of his cousin James Steelman. Shortly before or during 1800, he moved to the original Rutherford County, NC, taking the five sons of his cousin James Steelman with him. (Except for Joseph, nothing further is known of these sons.) He and his family are recorded in the 1800 and 1810 census for Rutherford county, NC. At some time before 1820, he and his wife moved to Tennessee, where they were living in 1827. (Mrs. L. F. Ellett - Women of the Revolution, Vol. 3, p.94) the place of their death and burial is not stated.

Your Thomas and James Steadman are brothers of my ancestor Nancy Steedman b. abt. 1822, d. 1859. They were three of 14 children of Thomas Steadman and an unknown wife. Thomas was b. abt. 1790 in Chester County, South Carolina, and moved to Rutherford County, North Carolina when he as a young child.

I have the Thomas you asked about as having been born in 1812 in Rutherford County, North Carolina. James was supposedly born in 1829, also in Rutherford County, NC.

The Steedman family is particularly interesting. They come from an impressive Scottish family which can be traced back to the 1100's in both the Steedman (Stedman - now often called Steadman) and Barton lines. Give me a few days and I'll try to send the entire family file to you.

If you are descended from this family, you might be interested to know that Thomas Steedman b. 1790 was the son of John Steedman (a Revolutionary War veteran) and Hannah McKinney Steedman. Hannah was six months old in her mother's womb when her mother was attacked and scalped by Indians. Hannah was born three months after her mother (Barbara Culp McKinney) should have died. The tough lady lived for another thirty years.

The caps were passed down and some of her descendents are said to still have them.

Barbara Culp McKinney is recognized in "Women of the Revolution."

Culp House

The design for this house was a version of the Greek Revival which was built in 1857, The front porch was a superimposed colonnade with six white fluted columns in each tier and a balcony with pierced balustrade. The airy balconies are characteristic of the Southern plantation architecture. From the front porch of this house Mrs. Ann Hill presented a flag to the Johnson Rifles, Union's first company of Volunteers during the War Between the States. In October, 1876, Wade Hampton made an address from the same porch.

The house is now the home of Willim Thomas Beaty II, and his sister, Mary Cornelia Culp.

In 1865 after General Lee had surrendered at Appomattox, Jefferson Davis and his cabinet were fleeing south to escape capture came to the home of General William Wallace on East Main Street in Union. They were served the noon meal there.

Cornelia Meng Culp (wife of Benjamin Dudley Culp) lent them her silver

service set with lots of home-baked items for the occasion. The most notable food item was a sugar bowl filled to the top. Sugar was in very short supply at the end of the war.

The silver service set is now in the Union County Museum.

For a wedding gift to Cornelia Meng, the brick home on North Mountain Street, was constructed--completed 1857---known as the Culp House.

After ten years he retired to Union where he lived in the old Culp home as he had let his father have money to keep the family running since his father was old now and retired. He was bad to drink but was also very kind and emotional. He would attend every funeral of his friends and weep and cry along with their family. He was liked by everyone. He rode around the state with the Red Shirts who protected Wade Hampton in 1870 when he was running for governor to help him get elected to free S.C. of the Carpetbaggers of that era. They all wore red shirts, rode horseback and carried Winchester rifles. Wade Hampton was elected. W. L. Culp died in 1905."

Benjamin Dudley Culp was the youngest child. He and my father did not get to go off to college like the older ones since Hill and Co. had gone out of business and our grandfather was getting old. However they both got good private school educations under Judge Townsend at the Boys Academy in Union and also my father went to Eastman Business College in Poughkeepsie, New York State for about six months and graduated there with his own money. Uncle Ben left home early and went West and traveled at first with one of the big circuses, either Ringland Brothers or Buffalo Bill Wild West Show. He would ride like Annie Oakley. He went to Washington living in both Seattle and Aberdeen. He worked at a saw mill there and got hit on the head by a plank. He decided to come home and go into the real estate business. He took many pictures of the old historic courthouse in Union which was then being torn down to make room for the present one. They gave him the old pillars of the building which he had made into monuments to the Culp family which are at Grace Cemetery today. He died while he was living in Norfolk, Virginia where he had a good job at the Portsmouth Naval Yards. He was in the Spanish American War. Dad and I went to Norfolk to get his body in 1919.

ANDREW JACKSON⁷ MCKINNEY (*JOHN⁶, JOHN⁵, BARBARA⁴ CULP, HANS CASPER³ KULP, PETER² KOLB, DIELMAN¹*) was born February 25, 1828 in Monroe Co., Mississippi, and died April 18, 1899 in Chickasaw Co., Mississippi. He married (1) PENELOPE MALONE May 28, 1846, daughter of JOHN MALONE and REBECCA PITTARD. She was born Abt. 1829 in Alabama. He married (2) SARAH A. TAYLOR. She was born 1834, and died 1906.

Notes for ANDREW JACKSON MCKINNEY:

Andrew Jackson "Jack" McKinney enlisted in the Confederate Army July 12, 1862, at Pittsboro, MS, for a period of three years. The enlistment officer was Capt. A. M. Reasons.

He appears on the Company Muster Roll for July 1, 1862 to Oct. 31, 1862, as a 2nd. Sgt. in Co. "F," Ballentine's Regiment of Cavalry.

In July 1862, Capt. J.G. Ballentine was ordered by Brig. Gen. Villespie who was then in command of North Mississippi, to collect and form into a regiment all independent and unattached companies then on duty in that area. The regiment was formed of six Mississippi companies and one Missouri and Tennessee Company. Two Mississippi companies and one Louisiana were added in October 1862, and one Tennessee company was added in Dec. 1862. In Aug. 1863, the regiment was reduced to ten companies by the consolidation of companies D and F. The regiment was called Ballentine's Regiment of Cavalry, but designated the 2nd. Regiment Mississippi Partisan Rangers in records of the Confederate War Dept. Andrew Jackson McKinney was a member of this Regiment.

McKinney fought in the Battle of Yazoo pass in Feb. 1863 and at Grenada in March 1863. He was assigned to Capt. John E. Fola's Company, Col. Acee's Regiment of Partisans.

The Partisan Rangers fought at the Battle of Hickahaly Creek, Wyatt, Sardis, Coldwater, Senatobia, and Hernando during the summer of 1863. When not in battle, the Partisans used guerilla tactics to cause as much as possible to the Yankees. They burned all the cotton in Vaiden, MS, before the Yankees got there in July 1863.

On Aug. 8, 1863, Jack McKinney deserted from the Partisan camp at Brandon, MS, and was absent without leave until Oct. 19, 1863, when he returned to his regiment. At that time, he lost his rank of sergeant and finished the war as a private. His wife, Penelope lost a baby just before he deserted, and he went home to be with her, gather the crops, and get the family's winter wood cut and gathered in. He could not send his wife money to live on, as he was only paid three times while in service--once on Aug. 31, 1862, and again on Feb. 28, 1863. The last time he was paid was Aug. 31, 1863; however, the muster rolls show his receiving his pay at a time when he was absent without leave.

Jack McKinney furnished his own horse and gun. Company muster rolls allowed "40 cents per day for use of horse, arms and c." Only once did he receive any pay for the use of his personal property. On

Aug. 31, 1862, he was paid \$48.00 by Capt. W.D. Hefflin for the use of his horse.

Jack McKinney fought until about two months before the war ended, when they ran out of anything to fight with. According to copies of company muster rolls received from the National Archives, he deserted Feb. 6 1867. The last official record we have of his military service is dated Feb. 29, 1864.

Jack McKinney fought for the Confederacy all four years of the war, except for the last two

months. He fought at the Battle of Bull Run. The man on either side of him was killed; his horse shot out from under him, his hat was shot off his head and a bullet made a hole in his coat tail. He didn't get a scratch. he wrote his wife, told her of his miraculous escape and requested that she name the child they were expecting Manassas. Sarah Manassas McKinney was born Nov. 15, 1864.

Two months before the war ended, Jack Mckinney decided enough was enough. He was wounded, had no horse, no shells for his gun and no shoes. He was starving to death, had dysentery and lice. He quit, quietly deserted and walked home a distance of several hundred miles.

Thanks for the pictures of the tombstones. I had originally gotten Bryson's information from a cemetery inscription book almost 30 years, but at the time didn't know who he was. Then I eventually wrote to the church to ask about him and was told the tombstone didn't exist any longer and there was only the footstone with his initials on it. The preacher had never heard of him, but gave my letter to A. Leon and Dot Steadman who were members of the church at that time, and they wrote to me. By that time, it was in the 1980's. Since then, Leon has passed away and Dot has dementia and is not doing too well, I've been told. I spoke to her daughter, Brenda, but she said she also has memory issues and couldn't give me any help on who might have Bryson's family bible. I was also recently told that someone had replaced his tombstone, but I do not know who that was.

The dates I have for Bryson's birth and death do not agree with what is on the new tombstone. I have his date of birth as 11 Oct 1815 and date of death as 19 January 1881, rather than the year of birth as 1819 and the month of death as June. This is what I have in my notes: "BURIAL: He's buried at Philadelphia Baptist Church Cemetery according to a cemetery inscription book. No obituary in Spartanburg newspapers; no probate file in Spartanburg County. Age at death 68y,3m,8d." If the age at death is correct, it doesn't add up to either date of birth or either date of death.

I wonder if there is now a sexton who maintains the cemetery's records, or if there are old church records kept anywhere.

I found Raymond's information on <findagrave.com>. And, I also found the name of Kate Steadman's husband at <familysearch.org>. He shares a tombstone with Kate, but the photo only showed the first three letters of his first name. However, after I found his name, I did a search again on <findagrave.com>, and he is not listed. So, there's another puzzle! It seems that every time you find a piece of information, there is always something different around the next corner.

"Francis Bartow Culp, my father, was named for General Bartow, a Confederate War general, a friend of my grandfather probably from the Mexican War where they probably fought together. He was born in 1861 and died in 1927, when I was 26 years old. I had to help Mother raise the other children as I was the oldest living child. My dad and mother two twins as their first born, Ruth Anthony and Charles Culp Little Charles died in about two or three weeks and Ruth lived to age two and died with pneumonia. She was always a delicate child mother said. The third child was still - born and they buried it at home on the farm. I was the fourth child yet the oldest. Cornelia was the second born two years later and Bartow in 1905. Dan McLeod was born in 1910 a seven months baby but grew up to be the strongest one of us physically. He was named for Rev. Daniel McLeod, a Methodist preacher at Grace who was a great friend of our family. His son Daniel R. McLeod is Attorney General for S.C. today. The McLeods were a fine family.

In 1865 after Lee had surrendered at Appomattox, President Jefferson Davis and his cabinet were fleeing South to escape the Yankees. They had their last Cabinet meeting at the old Wallace House on East Main Street in Union. They were served lunch or dinner there. My grandmother, Cornelia Meng Culp, loaned them the silver for the occasion. Jeff Davis was captured shortly and sent to Fortress Monroe, Virginia charged with treason. They kept him in jail for two years but never tried him. They set his bail at \$100,000 but Horace Greely and one of the Vanderbilts went his bail together with a rich German merchant of those days. It is said that the people in the South did not like Davis during the war but loved and admired him after his imprisonment for his devotion and loyalty to the South. Nearly every state has a county named for him. Also my Grandmother Culp was a very smart woman and practical. When he was a child my father told me he was out in the back yard cutting kindling wood for his mother and the hatchet struck his left hand and almost severed his left thumb right across the big nail. His mother took him in the house and sewed it back with a needle and thread. It only left a small scar on his left thumb. That was in the days of do it your self. I do not know how she kept it from getting infected.

In 1876 when General Wade Hampton was running for governor of South Carolina when he got to Union to make his speech the Culp family let him speak from the second story front porch to quite a large crowd of people. He went on to win the governor's race and was the first South Carolina Governor after the Civil War. Uncle Will Culp also rode around the state with the Red Shirts to protect Hampton. Voting rules were not so strict back then and old Sheriff Long of Union told me himself that he went around election day and voted 16 times for Hampton. Also thousands of Georgians at Augusta, Georgia crossed the river and voted for him too. The Carpetbaggers had been so crooked in running our state that South Carolina was determined to get rid of them."

In 1840, a Methodist Church was organized in Chickasaw County. William D. Rhodes donated the land for the church and cemetery. His son, G.D. Rhodes started building the church building, but died before it was finished. He was the first person buried in the cemetery. (This info conflicts with the Rhodes chapel inscription that states Jacob Rhodes is the founder. Jacob is indeed the first person buried in the cemetery. One explanation to the conflict could be that they meant to type JD Rhodes instead of GD. This is only speculation.) The paster, Rev. Frances Asbury Guin and his son, Jesse, finished the church. It was called the Rhodes Church, and was also used as a school. After Rev. Guin died, the name of the church was changed to Asbury Chapel as a memorial to him. He is also buried in the Asbury Cemetery. Florice G. Moseley wrote: "In 1909, Asbury Chapel was destroyed by a tornado. By this time Van Vleet had become a town and it was decided to rebuild there and call it Van Vleet Methodist Church. The cemetery is two miles south of Van Vleet and is still known as Asbury Cemetery.

Another account, given by Mrs. Howard Ray and Mrs. Doyle Stublefield, said the church building was destroyed by wind about 1900 and for several years the community was without a building. by that time many of the members were living in Van Vleet, so the church was rebuilt there on land donated by Anna Shaw Carter and Smith Shaw Jr."

When Charles Richard Rhodes was dying, he called his daughter Evolyne, who was fifteen years old at the time, to his bedside and asked her to help her mother raise Ruby and Omery, who were only two and three years old. Ruby was born Ruby House. She was an abused child, and her natural mother, who had been deserted by her husband, did not want Ruby. The mother gave Ruby to Sarah and Charlie Rhodes. Ruby was never legally adopted but went by the name Rhodes and was always treated as their child. Evolyn always did anything she could for Ruby and Omery; she and Leonard put Omery through school after they were married.

Notes for LEONARD BETTERTON:

Leonard Betterton was drafted for WW I while he and family lived and he worked in Bauxite, AR. He didn't see action overseas, but his hearing was damaged when he manned coastal defense guns in Virginia. He also provided mechanical service on those guns.

On another tour of duty, Leonard Betterton and others guarded a bridge between the United States and Mexico. The American force was to march mid-way of the bridge and return to the American side. One time, Leonard was obviously thinking of something else and marched to the Mexican side of the bridge before he realized it. The Mexicans just smiled at him and pointed him back toward the American side.

While he was stationed in Ft. Morgan, Alabama, Leonard and his wife and daughter Mamie lived in a house between the sea wall and Gulf. That house has since been blown away by a hurricane, but it offered family life during part of Leonard Betterton's military service.

Leonard rode circuit and was a Methodist minister for as many as three churches during the Depression. He sold McNess products to supplement income and later

became a carpenter. He and his daughter Allyne built their house on Horsehead Lake in Arkansas, when they moved from MS.

The only small thing I have noticed in the book so far is on page 12, in the box on the left, under #6vii: Herman Smith STEADMAN married Florence Ophelia HARRISON. In most of the family's correspondence and conversations, she is referred to as "Ophelia". She died 10 Sept 1938 and was buried first in Oakwood, then moved to Inman Cemetery. All accounts say she was a suicide, but her only remaining son, Fredrick, adamantly says she did not. He says she was trying to turn on the gas in the house after the utility company had turned it off, and it was an accident. I'm sure I have her obit and death certificate somewhere, but can't find them at the moment.

Meanwhile, take good care of yourself and don't ignore the doctor!!!

Dr. Dudley Culp Beaty, Jr., 87, passed away on Wednesday, February 26, 2014 at his home.

He was the Campaign Chairman of the United Way, and also its President for Marlboro County. Dr. Beaty was also a member of the American Legion for sixty years.

Along with his parents he was preceded in death by his sister, Kathleen Beaty Mayes.

2014 at his home in Union, SC.

Mr. Beaty was born in Union, June 21, 1923 the son of the late William Norman Beaty and Annie Janette Gore. He was the younger brother of three sisters, Cornelia (Neely) Meng Culp Beaty and her twin, Mary Norman Beaty Haynes, and Frances Whitmire Beaty Weeks.

Mr. Beaty attended Union public schools, and was a graduate of Union High School. He attended and was graduated from the University of South Carolina, Wofford College, Tulane University, Columbia University, The New York School of Social Work and the Sorbonne of Paris.

Mr. Beaty served six years in the US Army during World War II; mostly in Belgium, Germany and France. He was active for many years with the World Federation for Mental Health in various parts of the world. It is well known that he could read, speak and write in five languages including English, French, Italian, Spanish and German. Mr. Beaty was for many years Executive Director of the Ittleson Foundation and also the Van Ameringen Foundation, both located in New York City and operating throughout the world. Historical preservation was also one of his great interests.

Mr. Beaty was an Honorary Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, the American Public Health Association and many other professionally related bodies. He was the partial author of a biography of Clifford W. Beers, the founder in 1909 of the modern mental hygiene movement in America and abroad.

Mr. Beaty retired after 45 years to his native Union, SC, occupying the ancestral home built by his great-grandfather in 1847.
